How do I live in light of the above?	Walk with Jesus in Love by the power and Counsel of the Word, and His Holy Spirit


Q: How Do I Study Scripture?

A: Inductive study method


Step:	Spoiler Answer:
Observe	Read Scripture, asking for guidance from the Holy Spirit.
Interpret	Use sound principles of hermeneutics and exegesis.
Apply	Put what I've learned into action.
